Siliguri College of Commerce is a co-educational premier institution of North Bengal. It was established in 1962 to impart commerce & management education to the students of commercial hub of North Bengal. Since its inception, the college has been on a mission to impart quality and affordable higher education to students from all walks of life. It is committed to nurturing the talents and



manifesting the skills that they are imparted with.

In fact, University of North Bengal sanctioned Commerce as a subject to be taught in Siliguri College w.e.f session 1962-63. Later Siliguri College of Commerce was recognised as a Govt. Aided College under 2(f) & 12(B) of UGC Act, 1956 and was also affiliated to the University of North Bengal. The college shares infrastructure of Siliguri College by the approval of State Government and is run in evening hours. CONCEPT NOTE

It has been rightly stated by John Lewis- "A democracy cannot thrive where power remains unchecked and justice is reserved for a select few. Ignoring these cries and failing to respond to this movement is simply not an option for peace cannot exist where justice is not served." The pressing problems of the contemporary world has made enormous changes in the context of society and the geo-political periphery where the challenges are multifaceted in nature. These are posing a significant impact in the global context where ethical dilemmas, migration and exercising human rights has taken a bigger picture. The modern era is facing conflicts at a substantial rate which is hindering the status of living, access to basic needs, discrimination, exploitation and barbaric attacks upon civilians. The use of advanced technology in the warfare has completely altered the ethical landscape where the civilians are forced to migrate causing a threat to human civilization. The recent surge in the modern armed conflicts between nations has made a major impact upon forced migration and seeking refugees in the detention centers where the humanitarian appeal for the sake of living is almost negligible. Due to the displacement of refugees, it also creates tension between the local people and the displaced population. The marginalized groups face harrowing experiences like torture, sexual violence, genocide which questions the violation of human rights. The basic rights of access to food, shelter and healthcare are denied completely. The constant erosion of international humanitarian laws has created an environment where human rights violations are persisting with impunity. The lack of accountability undermines the effort towards reconciliation and peacebuilding. Moreover, the widespread changes have nonetheless affected the climate change aspect and the environmental degradation that amplifies scarcity of resources and also questioning the concept of sustainable development. The ethical practices and ethical policies have taken a toss escalating the vulnerability of the marginalized groups and the civilians. To address these complex issues an interdisciplinary approach is a requirement that brings together diverse perspectives and expertise to address these gripping problems. In the uncertainty of ever-changing panoramas, this approach would help to bridge between different disciplines and their relevance in the modern context. The conference tries to draw special attention to the global crisis prevailing in the modern context and welcomes a collaborative approach that transcends ways to develop a better society where human dignity, basic access to living conditions and ethical policies prevail that brings justice and equity and paves the route for a sustainable living.

TRANSPORT & COMMUNICATION

The Siliguri College of Commerce is situated in College Para, Siliguri approximately 15 km from Bagdogra Airport, making it easily accessible by various modes of transport. Nearby railway stations include Siliguri Junction (2 km), Bagdogra (12 km) and New Jalpaiguri Junction (4 km). Bagdogra offers domestic flights connecting to major cities like Kolkata, Delhi, Mumbai, Chennai, Bengaluru, Hyderabad and Guwahati. The Tenzing Norgay Central Bus Terminus is situated around 3 km away from the College, serves both stated-owned and private buses connecting to various destinations within and outside the state. From these transport hubs, taxis, auto-rickshaws and local buses are readily available to reach the College Campus.

WEATHER INFORMATION

In January, Siliguri experiences the mid of the winter season, characterised by cool and pleasant weather. Average daytime hights are around 25 degree celsius with nighttime lows near 15 degree celsius. The month sees about 7 to 8 hours of daylight daily, with a very poor probability of rainfall. Overall, January in Siliguri is pleasant during daytime and cool at night, with lush greenery and a vibrant atmosphere. Hence, carrying warm woolens is highly advisable.



Siliguri: Acts as a strategic junction connecting the hills of Darjeeling, Sikkim, Bhutan, Nepal, and the northeastern states of India. Popular attractions include: Mahananda Wildlife Sanctuary, ISKCON Temple, North Bengal Science Centre, Sevoke Coronation Bridge, Bengal Safari Park.
